

National Statesman Requirements

The SkillsUSA National Statesman Award is presented to students who attend and actively participate in Washington Leadership Training Institute (WLTI) functions and sessions, demonstrate leadership in action and complete these requirements:

- 1. **Complete the pre-conference assignments.** Turn them in digitally by Monday, September 18, 2017 using the following link: WLTI Prework.
 - a) Carl D. Perkins Paper
 - b) Skills Gap Paper
 - c) Promotion
- 2. Learn the SkillsUSA and civic awareness knowledge information and complete essays. Have a designated Statesman signer initial each item that they review. Complete the written essay questions. Turn in your completed statesman worksheet, with your name on it, to your state leader. Your state leader will deliver the delegations papers to the SkillsUSA Conference Headquarters before 8:30 am on Tuesday, Sept. 26.
- 3. Complete a five-minute one-on-one personal interview with a SkillsUSA national staff member, state association director, SkillsUSA board member or other individual. Statesman interviews begin at 7:30 a.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 27. Check the list outside the SkillsUSA Conference Headquarters for interview times and locations. Interview questions will be based on the essay questions and preconference assignments, as well as your overall WLTI personal experiences.
